This event will include live animals, activities, and discuss predators in the context of the food web, natural cycles, and habitat loss. This program will go over some of the animal processes that happen locally in the Lake Auburn Watershed. The live animals that will be presented are a turtle, snake, and an owl or opossum. This program is recommended for ages 8 and up, but is open to all.



Lake Auburn Watershed Protection Commission invites you to submit photos to be considered for our annual calendar in 2024.

Photo Submission Guidelines:

Deadline: September 13st, 2023.

Photos must be taken within the Lake Auburn Watershed and include Lake Auburn or one of its tributaries.

Photos must be digital, in high resolution (300 dpi minimum), in landscape/horizontal mode, and uncropped and unaltered (no adjustments, no enhancements, no filters, no watermarks).

How to Submit Photo Entries:

Please note that photo files may be too large to send more than 1 photo in an email.

By submitting photos you are agreeing for LAWPC to use and credit your photos in the calendar and for other materials.

Each photo submission must include the photographer's name, email address, location of photo, and time of year the photo was taken. Please save each photo with the following file name format: lastname_timeofyear_title



Changing Winters and Lake Auburn

Maine's lakes are being affected by changes in Maine's winters. Climate change is causing warmer air and water temperatures on average, longer growing seasons, and shorter winter periods.

The local effects we see on Lake Auburn is a decreased Ice-On period. Ice on the lake and frozen grounds on the watershed gives Lake Auburn a break from surface runoff and excess nutrient and pollution deposits during the winter. With the changing climate, that break is shortened and there is a longer window for surface runoff deposits. Maine has also been seeing more patterns of intense snow storms, followed by warm weather that melts the snowpack. This sequence causes large volumes of surface runoff and lots of erosion, leading to an end result of high phosphorus inputs into Lake Auburn.

While we can't change the weather or climate locally, what we do have control over is land management and conservation. With proper watershed care like conserving large properties, maximizing vegetation on lawns and developed areas, and eliminating the use of fertilizers, we can mitigate surface runoff and pollution that has been increasing with changing winters.






